Language Link Screening Results Explained

A Guide for Parents



Your child has now completed Speech and Language screening in school. The results of their assessment have been added by the school to the back of this booklet.

What is Speech and Language Screening?



A Speech and Language Screening Assessment is a test which helps the school to identify if your child has any Speech, Language and Communication Needs (SLCN).

The [Language Link](#) Assessment looks at your child's understanding of spoken words and ideas.

Why is it important?



We use Speech and Language skills constantly to communicate our wants and needs and to build strong bonds with other people. Language skills are also important for our learning. In schools and at home, we learn new skills and gain new knowledge by listening to others talking and reading written language. The demands on language skills only increase as children get older and progress through their education.

Problems understanding language can be very difficult to spot by observation alone. Children can be good at copying their peers and using clues to hide a lack of understanding. A difficulty with understanding which is not picked up can lead to problems with spoken language, literacy and behaviour.

How was my child assessed?



A member of school staff who is trained in completing the assessment sat with your child. The online assessments are picture based and children often enjoy completing them. They take around 30 minutes to complete.

What happens if the screening assessment indicates my child has Speech, Language and Communication Needs?



If the screening assessment identifies that your child has some difficulties with speech or language, the school staff will discuss what everyone can do to help your child to make progress.

Your child's teacher will be able to use teaching and learning strategies in the classroom to help your child with their areas of need.

In addition, they might suggest including your child in a language group or a specific intervention for extra support in school.

They may also suggest a referral to another agency (e.g. Speech and Language Therapy) to look in more depth at the difficulties indicated.

What can I do to help at home?



A vast amount of language learning happens at home and your input makes a big difference.
